Luke 8:40–56 The raising of Jairus's daughter and the healing of the woman with a hemorrhage

Overview: His power over the death of a twelve-year old girl and over the twelve-year sickness of a hemorrhaging woman demonstrates that Jesus is the resurrection and the life (Cyril of Alexandria). The accounts bring out several parallels and similarities: the girl at twelve years old is about to die at an age when she would have entered womanhood, and a woman has been hemorrhaging for twelve years, as long as the little girl had been alive. Jesus vivifies the one and heals the other (Ephrem the Syrian).

The dying daughter represents the synagogue and the woman with the flow of blood the church as it reaches out in faith to touch the hem of Jesus' garment (Ambrose). The woman with the flow of blood is also unclean, which is why she stays hidden and steals the healing from the hem of Jesus' garment (Cyril of Alexandria). Yet in her hiddenness, Jesus' divinity is revealed, and he sees in her a hidden faith that is proclaimed to the crowds (Ephrem the Syrian).

Jesus has shown his power over nature, demon possession and sickness. These three miracles lead up to the final miracle: the passion of Jesus and his resurrection from the dead (Ambrose). The woman touches the tassel of Jesus' garment, his sacred hem, and she is healed (Prudentius). The power to heal is inherent in Jesus' very nature as God, and flows out of him to heal this woman (Cyril of Alexandria). The reason Jesus heals her womb is to show that clothed in our humanity he might reveal his divinity through the art of healing. Jesus says to the woman healed of a twelve-year flow of blood, "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace." Faith is the means by which anyone now may enter the family of Jesus, and peace is the crown of victory she receives because of her faith (Ephrem the Syrian). These words of Jesus are spoken to the girl's father to give him comfort. To believe in the possibility of resurrection for his daughter requires faith that in Jesus there is the cause of life (Cyril of Alexandria).

The people laugh at Jesus when he says that the girl is not dead but sleeping, but Jesus does not lie, for those who die in Christ will arise from the dead (Cyril of Alexandria). So when Jesus awakens her he orders that food be given to her to show that she is fully alive and well (Ephrem the Syrian). Jesus' command to silence, before his resurrection, alerts catechumens to the significance of Jesus' resurrection as central to the mystery of the faith and to those mysteries—the sacraments—through which their bodies as well as their souls are fed holy food and touched with Christ's resurrection power (Ambrose).

Our tithing is down! Please relook at how much you are tithing and increase it by 1%. According to our census we have 71 members. That should be 71 tithing members. According to bestplaces.net the average



annual income for Old Forge is \$26,071. That is approx. \$2172.26 a month. This is just the average and I am not including household incomes. EVERYONE IS ON A FIXED INCOME except some make more and some make less. Fixed income is a misnomer. If everyone tithes 10% we would not be worried about finances. An average monthly tithe of \$217.26 from everyone would be \$15,425.34 monthly and annually \$185,104.10. Again, this is an average.

WE HAVE PARISHIONERS STILL OPERATING UNDER THE MINDSET OF PAYING DUES!! WE CANNOT CONTINUE TO EXIST THIS WAY. OUR CHURCH'S PURPOSE IS NOT TO EXIST BUT TO LIVE! IF WE ARE NOT LIVING ACCORDING TO THE GOSPEL, THEN WE ARE NOT LIVING A LIFE DEDICATED TO CHRIST. A RECAP OF THE LAST 4 YEARS: Current Bank Balance \$122,121.06 w/ two CDs at M&T Bank for \$100k and \$150K.

A quick review of the last 4 years shows that each year we were ending the year in a deficit and beginning in 2022 we began fixing and repairing items that were long overdue. Also, the church was spending money out of the general fund for cemetery maintenance while not touching any of the cemetery accounts(?). Our yearly budget which is attainable is \$155K pending any major expense on the buildings/cemeteries in which we will do a capital campaign for. Currently we have 5 campaigns.

- 1. Replace Federal Pacific fuse box in rectory. Requirement for insurance. Was supposed to be replaced in the 1980s when Federal Pacific went out of business due to fires caused by fuse box. \$\$?? raised: \$5K
- 2. Repaint Cupolas estimated Cost: \$13K
- 3. Paint ceiling dark blue w/stars for cosmos estimated Cost: \$12K raised: \$7K
- 4. Repair walls from leaks estimated Cost: \$5K raised: 0
- 5. New Red Carpet and replace carpet in Altar estimated Cost: \$5K raised: \$0
- 6. COMPLETED Repair Leaking Roof: Cost \$2700 Received \$5K from insurance
- 7. COMPLETED Repair busted pipes in Hall: Cost (still waiting on invoice) Received \$10K from insurance
